



# MADIBA REMEMBERED A film by Mark Kaplan

This 30 minute documentary poignantly directed by award-winning filmmaker, Mark Kaplan, captures Nelson Mandela – the man and the icon – from the moment of his death through the recollections of University of Cape Town's archives, its alumni and its current generation.

UCT Special Collections has a vast collection of Mandela memorabilia comprising films, books, posters, photographs and cartoons. The film draws on images taken by some of South Africa's foremost photographers, recollections of Artist Lionel Davis who was a fellow prisoner on Robben Island, and internationally acclaimed cartoonist Zapiro (Jonathon Shapiro). Key and diverse voices in this film range from Vice Chancellor Dr. Max Price, Professor Njabulo S Ndebele, Archbishop Njongonkulu Ndungane, Professor Thandabantu Nhlapo and undergraduates.

Propelled by the live performance of brilliant South African musician, Vusi Mahlasela, at a memorial concert, the film is humorous, upbeat and at times, surprising. While the film sets out to document Mandela and his links to UCT, it also has unexpected elements of "Madiba Unplugged".

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#### 20 YEARS OF DEMOCRACY EXHIBITION



This photographic exhibition reflects the special moments the 'New South Africa' ushered in as it moved from apartheid to a democracy. As Professor Njabulo Ndebele noted, life in South Africa is about a dance between the spectacular and the ordinary. Using this metaphor, the exhibition shows iconic and ordinary moments that speak to the country's past and its ongoing evolvement.

The exhibition showcases the work of some of South Africa's leading photographers and also reflects new voices in a post-apartheid South African photography. It deals with the legacies of the TRC, land reclamation and the AIDS pandemic but despite these dark issues, a current of celebration runs throughout the body of work. Beyond the symbolism embodied by Nelson Mandela himself and all he lived and stood for, photographers in this exhibition also explore the less explored aspects of ordinary society ranging from spirituality to identity and even

David Goldblatt, whose work also appears in this exhibition, sees his work not in distinct periods but as an ongoing visual interrogation of our society; "During the apartheid years my primary concern was with values: what our values were, how we had arrived at them, and particularly how we expressed them. And once you start with that line of thinking, there is no break, there is a continuation. I am still concerned with what our values are, and how we are expressing them" (Interview Then and Now).

This photographic exhibition, forming a significant part of an extensive digital collection, is drawn from the archives of UCT Libraries' Special Collections which houses approximately a million photographs representing the work of over one hundred photographers.  International Consortium Project - Square Kilometre Array (SKA) Project in partnership with Australia will be a game-changer in next decade

# Leadership readiness to strengthen institutional partnerships

- Traditional approach to research support was in silos (functional) across the institution
  - ICT links researcher to HPC & related technologies
  - Library links researcher to scholarly materials, makes resources accessible and preserves content
  - Research Administration links researcher to grants & monitors IP & research output

- eResearch infrastructure is the easy part the challenge lies in relationships & organisational issues
- Basic premise that collaboration in eResearch needed to start in "our own backyard" if we wanted to advance eResearch and gain competitive advantage in the HE sector
- Recognition that conditions were favourable at UCT to develop collaborative relationships across the campus

# Collaboration in eResearch should start "in our own backyard"

- New ED: ICTS focus shifted to need for research support and, in particular, to build capacity and capability for eResearch support (infrastructure, data management, tools and expertise)
- New ED: Libraries focus challenged "silo approach" to research support and questioned role in the issue managing, preserving and making accessible research data sets as part of its collection
- DVC Research with ED: Research Office reviewing the UCT research strategy for the next 20 years

# Strategic partnerships became the catalyst

- The future of eResearch at UCT directly linked to successful strategic partnerships and collaboration across the institution
- Research strategy (2015-2025) recognises eResearch as key in research support
- Library strategy (2015-2019) is to build strategic partnerships with key stakeholders across the campus in support of research

## Success can be ascribed to:

- open and positive approach to collaborative relations at leadership levels
- shared vision of a research support cycle with the "researcher at the centre"
- contributing equally (people & financial resources) to eResearch implementation
- buy-in for recalibration & realignment of research support business processes across campus



### eResearch Centre: Research-governed and academically-led


International model is an eResearch Centre – an organisation in its own right, but also a broader partnership with other areas that provide eResearch services, such as the Research Office, ICTS and the Library.



# eResearch @UCT: enterprise-wide responsibility & accountability

- UCT set up Project Implementation Committee (PIC) – stakeholders & PM is a retired Engineer
- Mandate to establish eResearch services, facilities and expertise with the "researcher @ centre"
- Integrate multiple service support at relevant points on the research support cycle

## The Research Support Cycle



# Assigning responsibility and accountability

- Clarify roles & responsibilities to reduce risk of duplication and/or gaps
- Individuals are responsible & accountable
- A committee cannot "look after" or execute tasks

# RACI: a project management tool

- Assign responsibility in cross-functional & inter-departmental projects
- 2 dimensional matrix with tasks on one axis and participants on the other
- R responsibility for the task
- A accountable for the task
- C consulted before decision is made
- I informed/included in communications

# Some simple RACI principles

- Every row should have R & A UCT modified the model and has assigned R&A to one participant to avoid confusion
- Only one A per row to ensure clear assignment of work
- The tool avoids assumption that participants are working on tasks which can lead to gaps and/or duplication

### **Research Data Management**

- Policy development
- RDM plans
- Efficient tracking of versions
- Data curation and preservation
- Storage, access, authorization and authentication issues
- Ensuring ethical undertakings are honoured

### **Research Visibility and Discovery**

- The extension of existing collections management practice
- Link data to related publication
- Consistent naming of elements (metadata policy and guidelines)
- Citability = impact
- Interoperability with global and discipline-specific research infrastructures






## Conclusion
