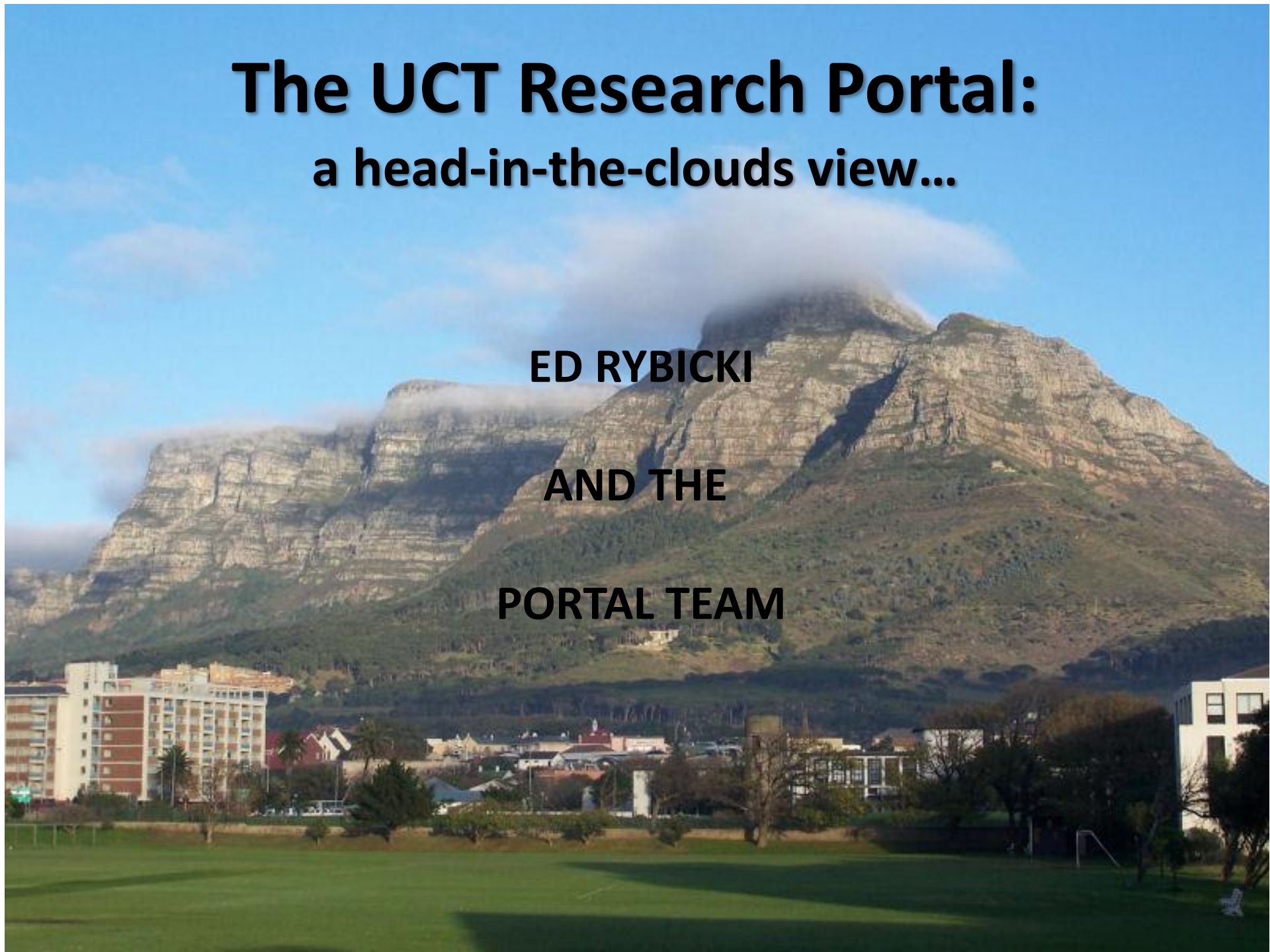

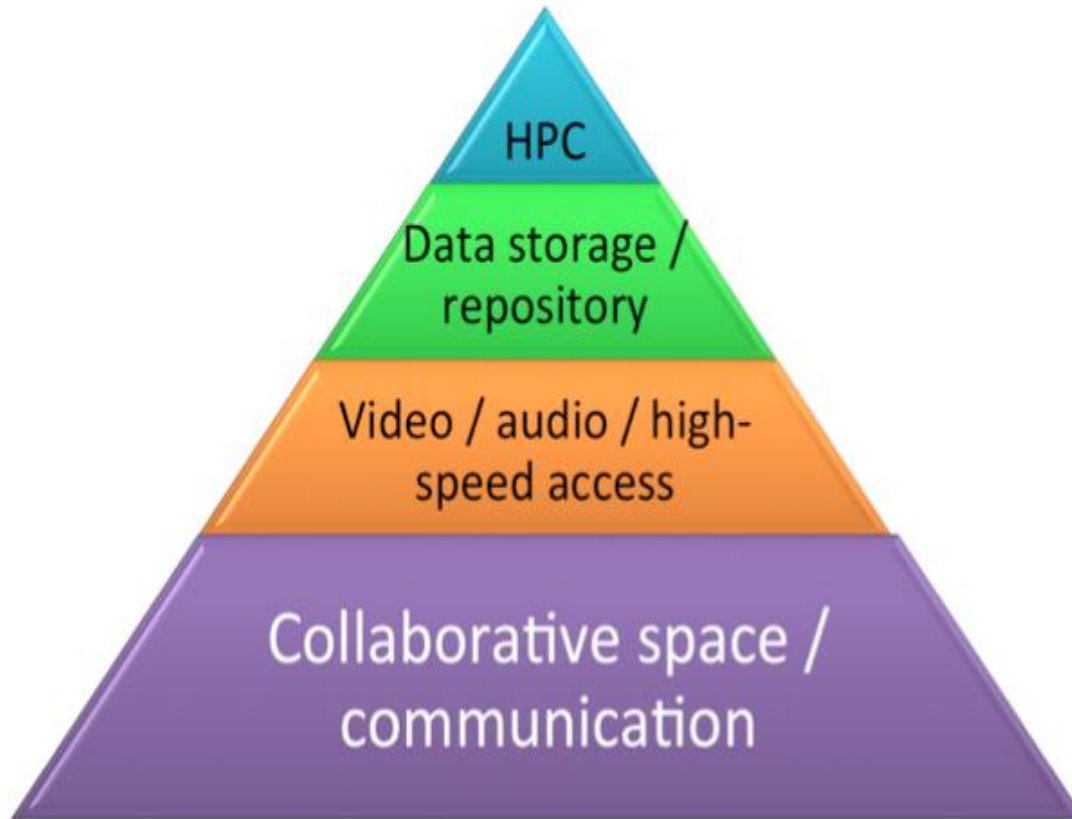

Overall, the survey showed that the user needs at UCT were as shown by the following diagram:

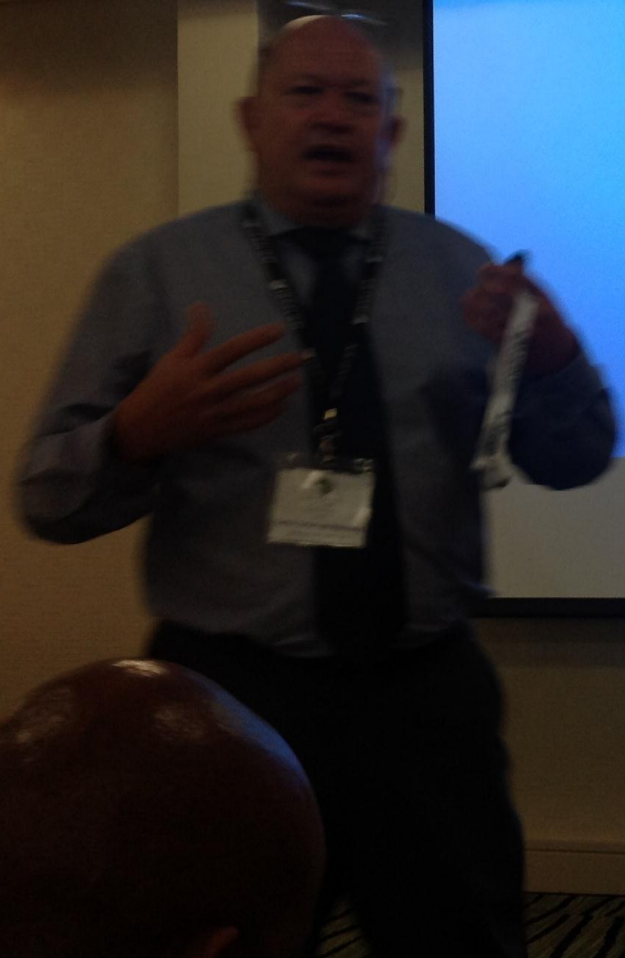


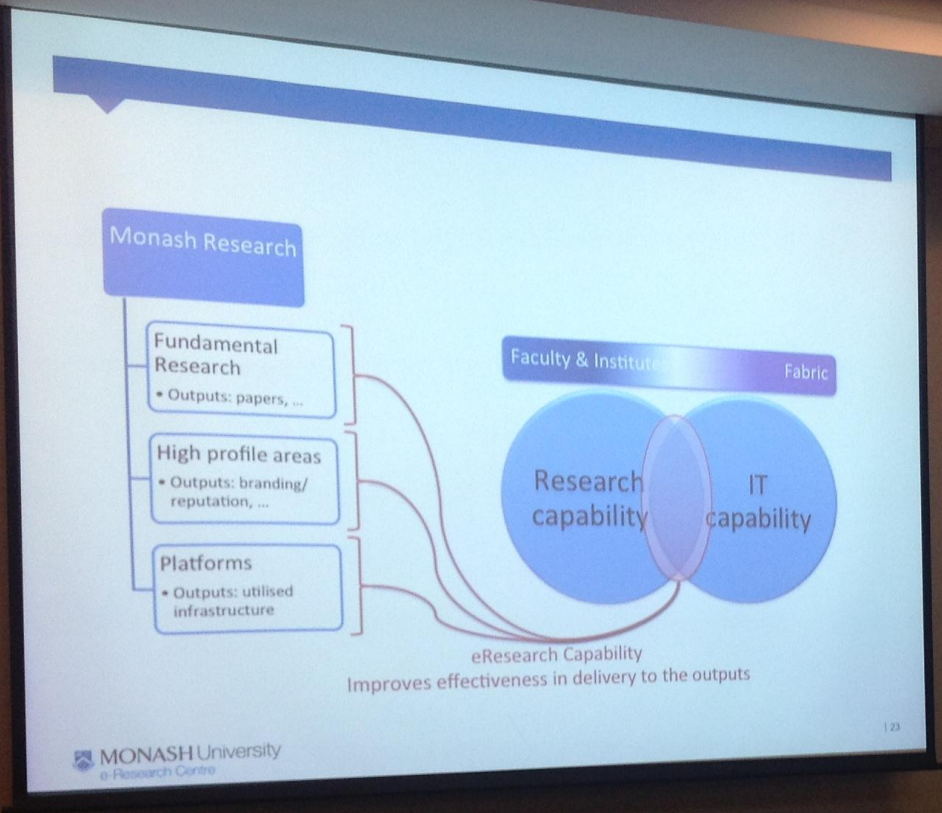


After Australia Tour 2011

- "My UCT" and "My eResearch" (eg) tabs on a UCT home page visible after login on chosen PC - with only the standard UCT page available to non-logged in or outside users
- My EResearch goes to pages which can be personalised - eg: "My Publications, My Tools, My Library" eg.
- My Publications should have a dynamic link to some search engine (or several), like SCOPUS if we get it, ISI Web of Science - and should be seamlessly available when off-campus via login or a MUCH improved version of EZProxy. It should also have tools available like Endnote Web.
- My Library should go straight into an improved library front page, again available from off-campus.
- My Tools is important because this could be very personalisable - it should have links to a variety of chosen cloud tools and tools made available specifically to that user by tiered support from ICTS / eResearch support. One of these should be "My Storage", which would allow easy drag-and-drop file storage, for example, and even complete machine backup services.

URC Funding

Research Professional Africa is a platform that allows access to the **latest global coverage of Research Funding Programmes** as well as Science and Technology news and Innovation policies.

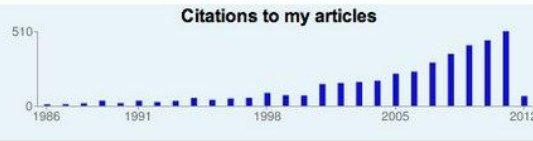
This is an essential resource and we encourage all UCT staff to take full advantage of the funding opportunities which span the full spectrum of research disciplines and sponsors.

- For NRF Funding Opportunities:
 - Applications must be submitted online on or before the internal deadline.
 - Internal Contact - Ms Mtsembukazi Sibindlana (Research Office)
 - Postgraduate Student applications - Internal Contact - Ms Bongiwe Ndamani (Post Graduate Funding Office)
- For International Funding Opportunities:
 - All applications for international research grants **which require institutional approval** should be submitted to RCIPS (maghmuda.ockards@uct.ac.za). Prior to this, approval of the budget should be sought from the concerned faculty's finance manager. Where

Academic Output Assessment

The links below are intended to facilitate access to tools that may be used to provide objective evaluations of academic and research outputs. These may be used, for example, to provide valuable information on citations, Hirsch and other formal and informal indices of publication impact.

ISI Web of Knowledge / Web of Science

This a tried and trusted means of seeing just who has published what, how often, and what their Hirsch, or h-index is.

Use [EZProxy](#) for off campus access

Google Scholar

This is becoming increasingly useful these days - and is FREE! There is a useful Mozilla add-on for Scholar, which calculates h-indices for you.

Harzing's Publish or Perish

This is a software program that uses [Google Scholar](#) to obtain the raw citations, then analyzes these and presents a set of statistics.

It is especially useful for Computer Science and Humanities research areas, which are not well covered by other assessment tools.

SciVal Spotlight

This new tool from Elsevier is best used for strategic institutional assessment, as it displays multi-, inter- and trans-disciplinary publication data in several different graphical forms, over a five year period. It can also very easily be used to discover potential collaborators in similar research areas.

Elsevier's Scopus

This is newly available. It won't give you as high an h-index if you were publishing before 1996, because it doesn't do citations from before that - however, it has a wider coverage than WoK, so many more papers.

Use [EZProxy](#) for off campus access

Google Scholar Citations

With a little training, this will find ALL your publications, and immediately give you lifelong and 5-year h-indices - as well as an "i10 index", which "... is the number of publications with at least 10 citations".

AltMetrics

A very good set of tools for assessing blog or other Web posting impact, such as references to scholarly articles in Twitter and other social media.

Inspire

This is a citation search tool used by the high energy physics community. [inSPIRE](#), <http://inspirehep.net/>, is the second generation of SPIRES, the very first website that was created in North America. One can very easily look up papers by author, have a citation summary produced or do any number of useful activities.

Increasingly popular page: access to various means of accurately assessing your own or others' publication outputs – including informal or social media mentions

Research Facilities



The [Research Facilities database](#) contains information on major items of equipment that may be of interest to researchers in addition to those in the department in which the facility is housed. In many cases this equipment is available for use by researchers in other departments and in general there will be charges for such use. Many facilities will require a researcher to be trained in the usage of the equipment before it is made available to them and in some cases the equipment may only be operated by staff of that facility on behalf of an external researcher.

The information in this database has been provided by the departments housing the facility concerned and any queries should be directed to the contact persons listed for that facility. Please note that some of the information in the database may not be current and we are in the process of updating this information.

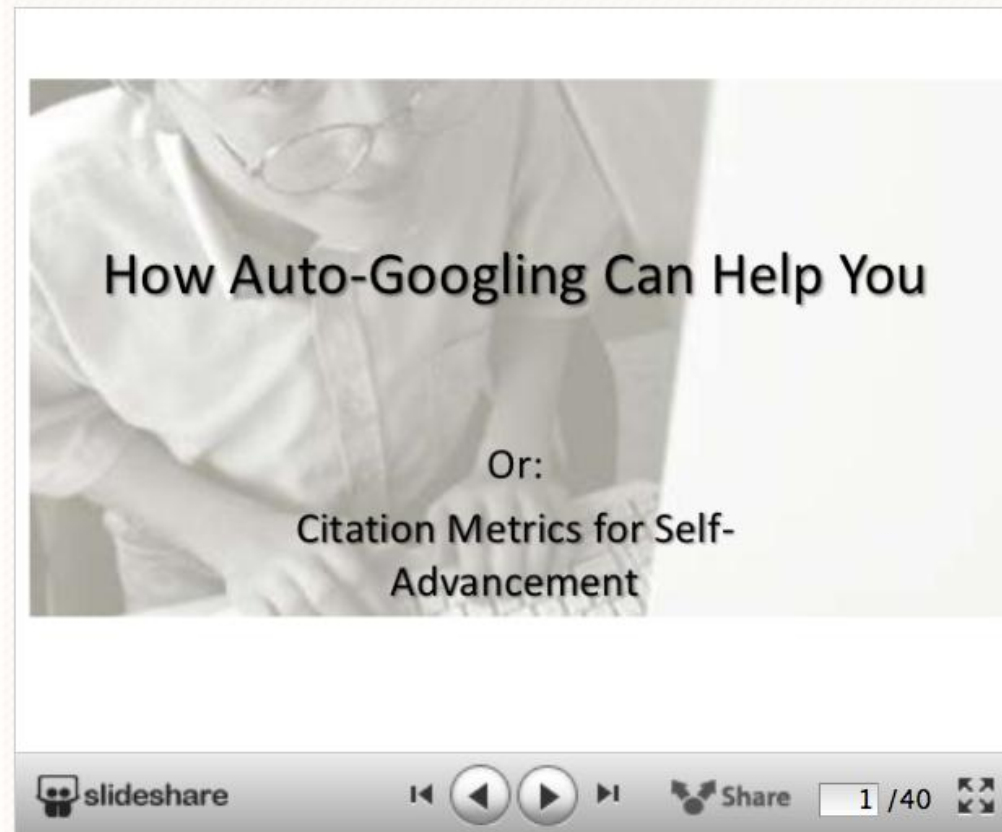

Create some dynamic access links to Irma / other databases, create templated Profiles which include “Scholarly Resources” – publication lists and other forms of publication



NOTE: both Scholarly Resources and Profiles require significant development and policy decisions. Eg: SR not just database output; also represents “non conventional” publications for Humanities etc – video, digitised artworks?

The Profiles are underpinned by a database and Portal – RAD – which, like the TARDIS, is far larger on the inside, and provides similar functionality to what we propose for UCT

Objective for UCT Profiles: 1

To reduce the number of times that a UCT academic has to provide the same information for different institutions or purposes

to one time only!

- To allow highly user-configurable output of curricula vitae for printing OR Web use
- Use by Departments, Faculty, Bremner, the UCT Research Office, IAPO, and the NRF, to “pull” data for specific purposes into (eg) forms for:
 - for academic assessment and leave,
 - applications for travel and research
 - equipment funding
 - to harvest information on collaborations, international partners, updated research activities

Examples:

Research expertise, personal profiles, collaborations, publications, patents, open teaching material, reports....

Use by NRF:

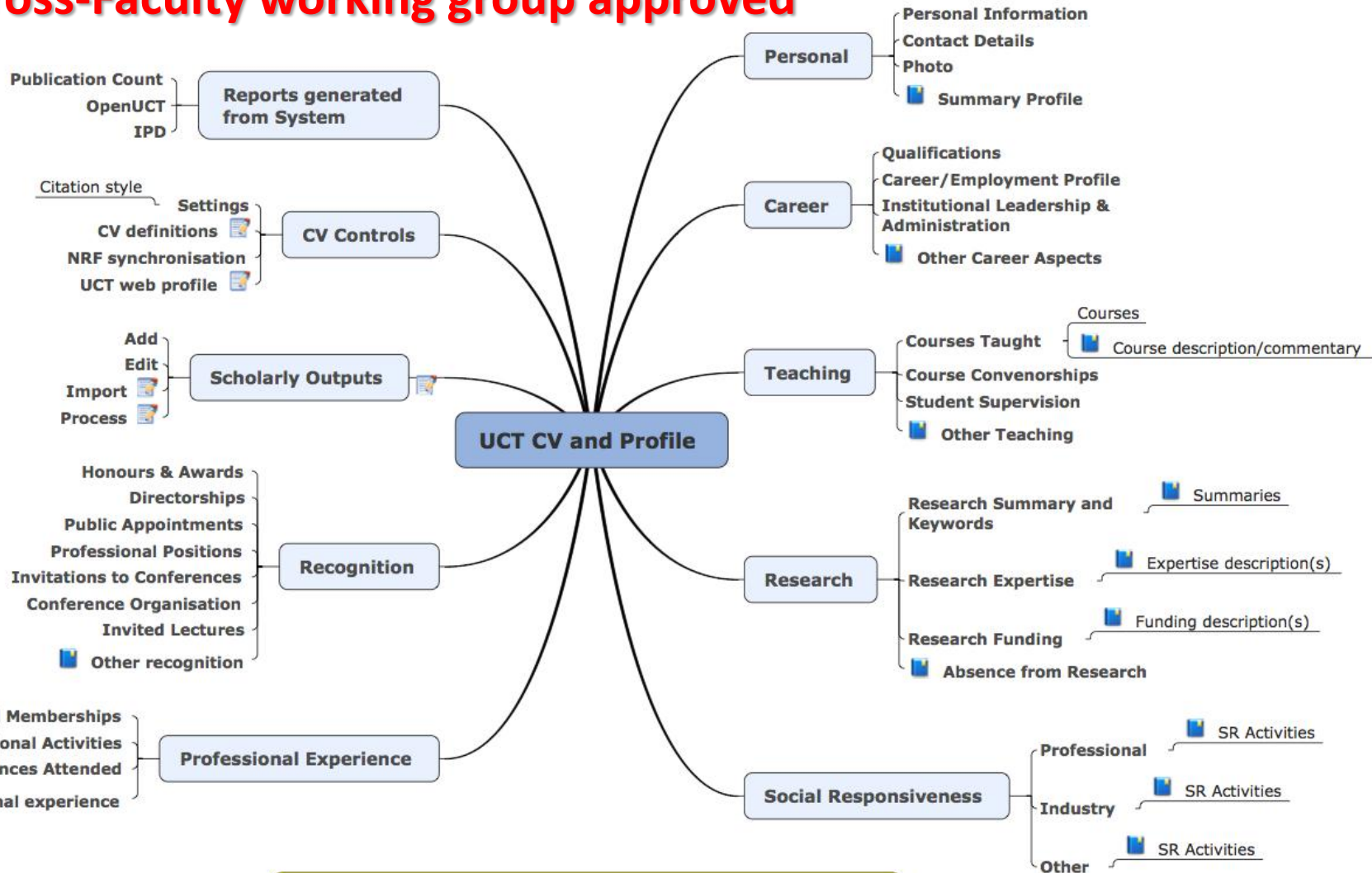
Synchronise information between UCT and NRF to reduce time spent on NRF systems, AND

ALLOW DIRECT IMPORT OF PUBLICATION DATA

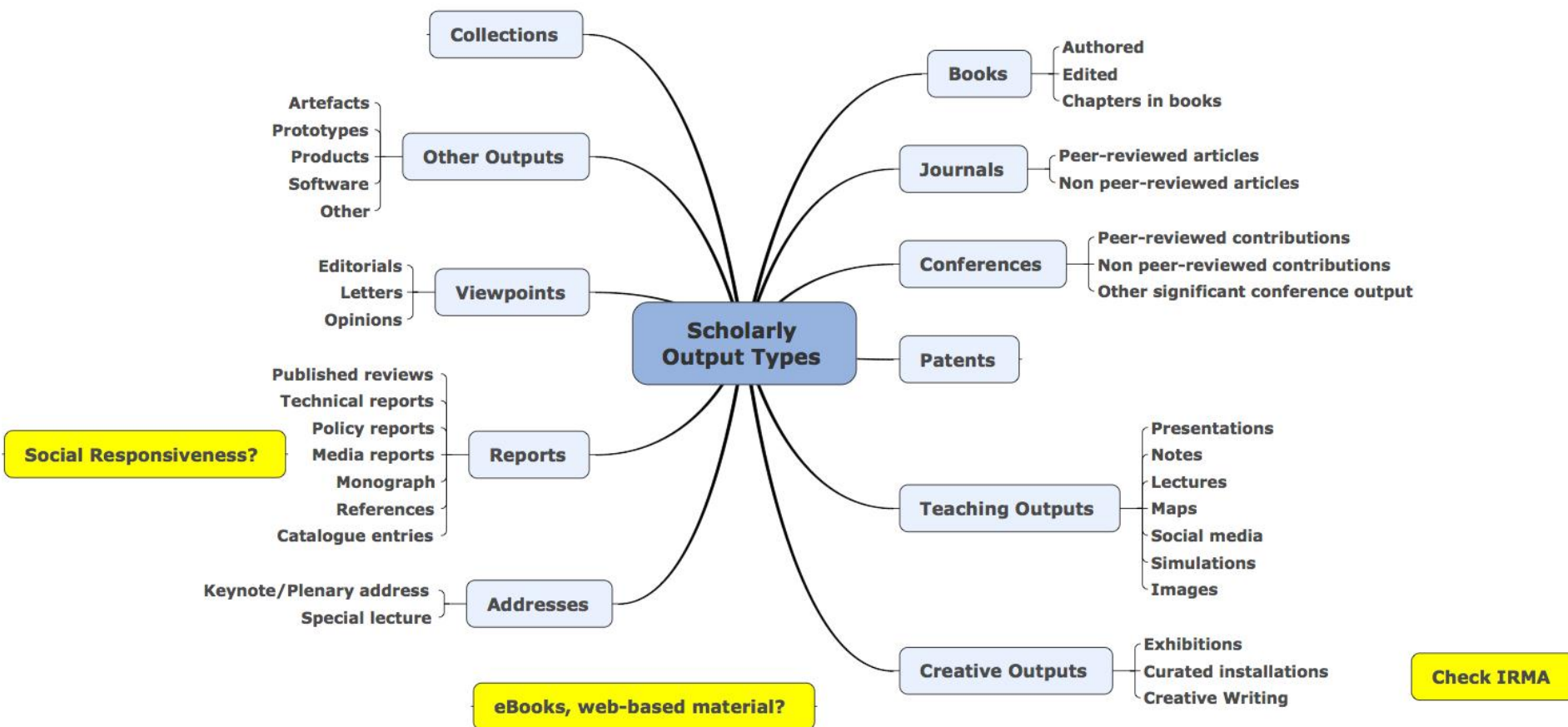

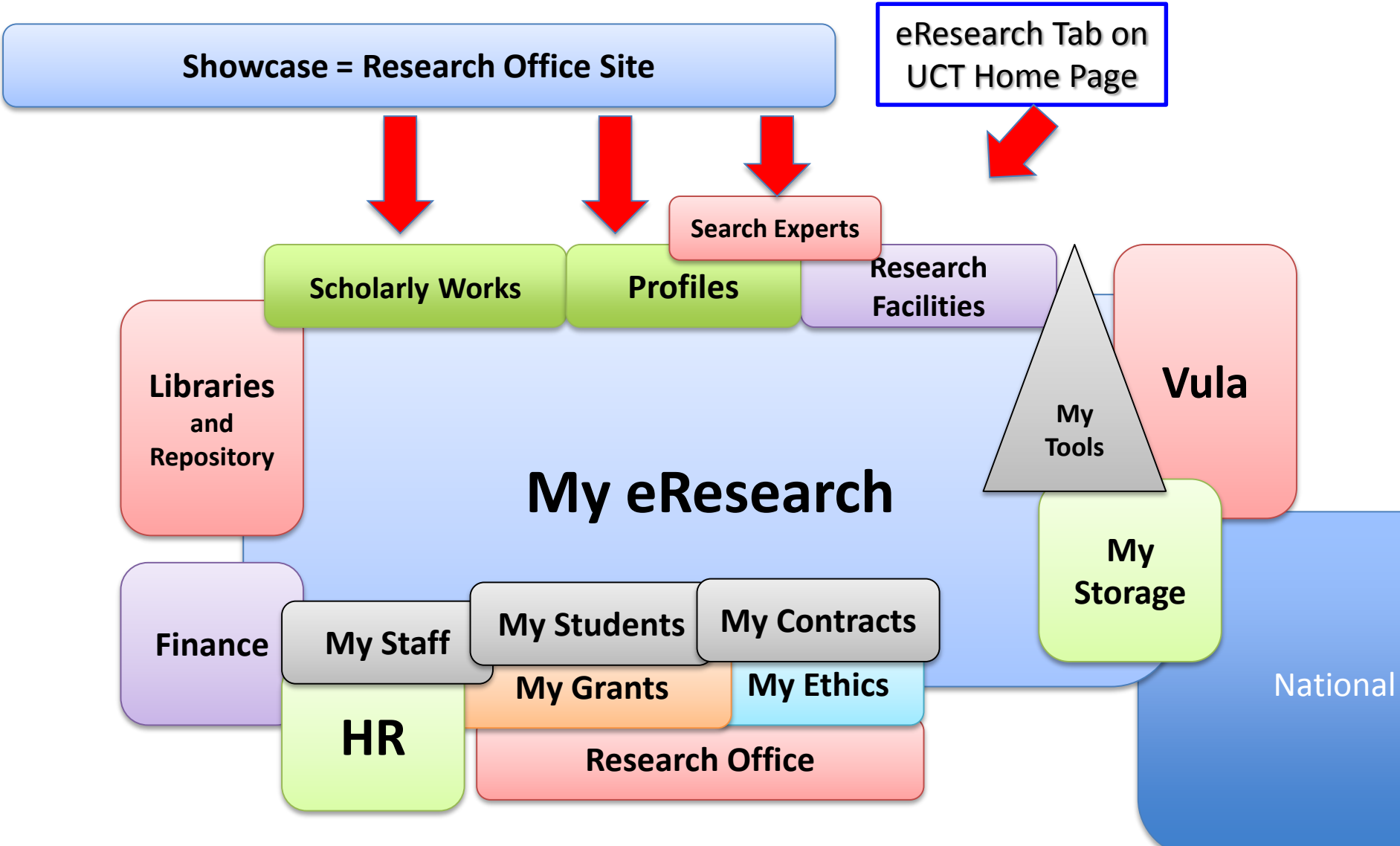

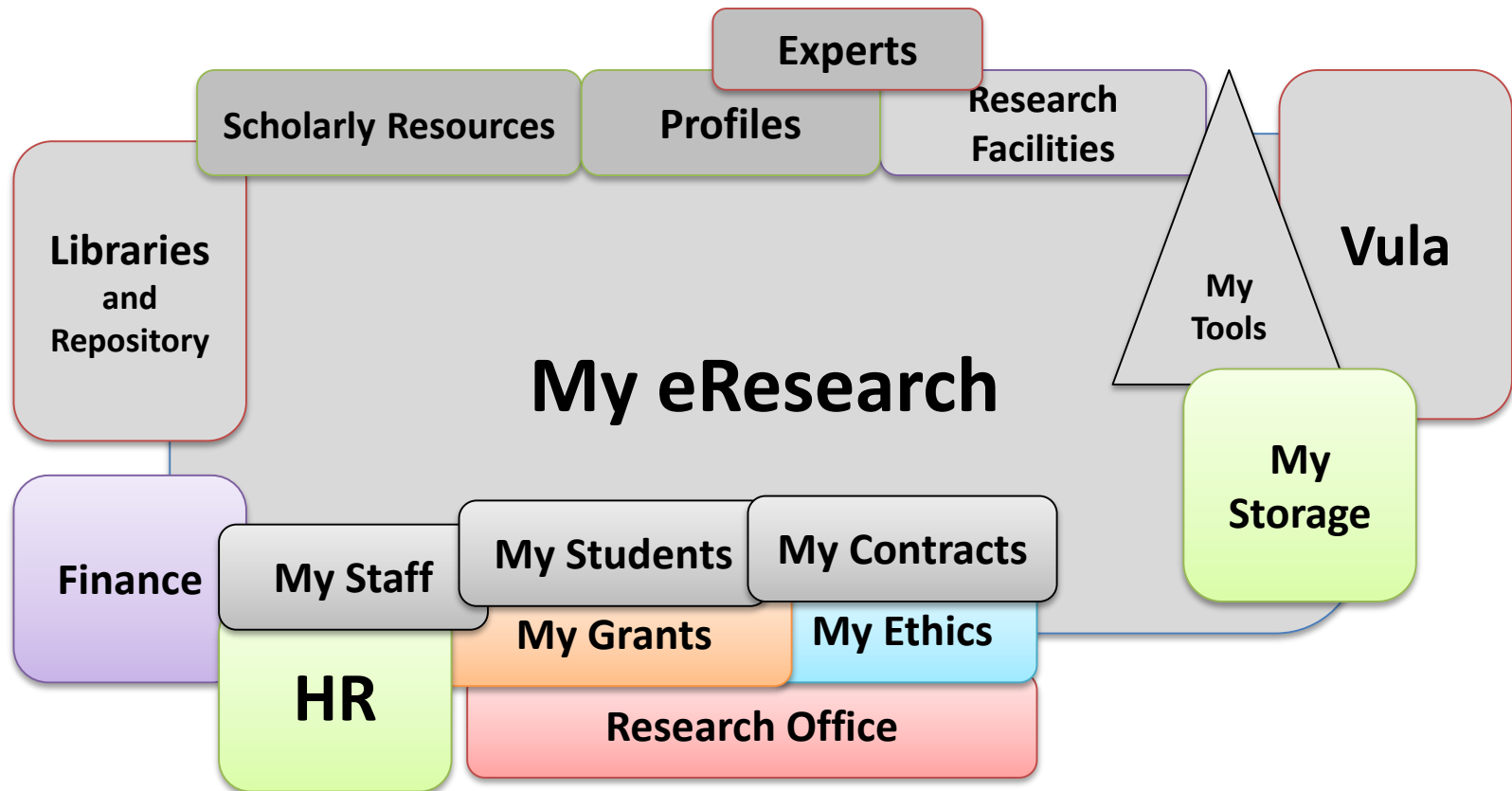
Concept as of mid-2012:

NRF Blues: Or, WHY Do We Have To Use This System??

Dear NRF folk; **LINKS TO SLIDESHOWS ON eRES RESOURCES**

I have just spent an unconscionably long time having to fill in, field by individual field, my 2011-2012 publications in the "new" NRF applications environment. This could have required 10 operations per record; however, I left out the first two fields, so it was only 8. As it was, the exercise took me the best part of an hour, for just 12 records: it interrupted my work day to the extent that I had to keep going back to it as other things obtruded, and in fact had to repeat two records because they got lost. I also had to correct a number of mistakes that occurred because of cutting-and-pasting into the wrong boxes – a MOST frustrating exercise, all around!!

I have written elsewhere about how I have simply not bothered to fix the records for all my book chapters and patents, or my papers before 2005: it is SO much work, for things THAT WERE IN YOUR DATABASE ALREADY, that I am simply not going to bother at all. In fact, I think some of those publications – dating back to 1981 – have been entered / altered in your systems AT LEAST THREE TIMES, as NRF systems have lurched from change to change, without being backwards compatible with previous versions.
